Better Hearing & Speech Month

During the month of May, Speech-Language Pathologists across the country recognized Better Hearing and Speech Month. The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association's designated theme for this year was "Building Connections." The realities of living through a pandemic highlighted our need for human interaction and challenged us to find new ways to connect in nearly every aspect of life.

This past year, we have all found different ways to build connections. The children receiving therapy through our Center continue to do so through teletherapy. We have learned to build connections over the internet as we work to improve their communication to help change their lives for the better.

Here at the San Diego RiteCare Childhood Language Center, I provide services to children with delays and disorders in the following areas:

- Articulation errors in the production of speech sounds
- Stuttering disruptions in the fluency of speech
- Phonology patterns of sound errors
- Receptive Language difficulty understanding what is said
- Expressive Language difficulty using spoken language to express thoughts
- Childhood Apraxia of Speech motor speech disorder where the child knows what he/she wants to say, but the brain has difficulty coordinating the muscle movements needed.
- Voice unusual vocal quality

This year has taught us the importance of human interaction, communication, and connection. I feel privileged to be able to help children gain and improve the skills need to achieve these.

Your Venerable Master of the Lodge of Perfection

About Michael

Michael Thomas Sherman was born on July 27, 1955 in Colorado to James and Sophia Sherman. His father, a Captain in the Army Corp of Engineers, was stationed in Fort Carson in Colorado Springs. His mother was a nurse. As an army brat, Michael lived in different places around the world although he grew up mostly in San Luis Obispo, California. Here, he learned how to swim and surf at Avila Beach. He remembers hitch hiking with his surfboard to the beach and staying in his uncle's studio while enjoying the surf. He finally ended up in Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin where he learned that snow is cold. He remembers the first time playing in the snow. His hands got so cold he ran in the house and turned on the hot water to thaw them out. He found out that was the wrong thing to do. To this day when the weather gets cold Mike has to put on gloves to keep his hands from cramping.

After finishing tenth grade, his father, along with the local sheriff, figured it was time for him to join the U.S. Navy in order to straighten him out. Mike agreed (I don't know if he had a choice) as he was starting to stray from the straight and narrow. He spent a little over three years in the navy rising to the rank of E4 (Boatswains Mate 3rd Class). He served at the end of the Vietnam War aboard a patrol boat for 6 months. He remembers water skiing behind the PT boats during "down times" when he was overseas. Since he was a great swimmer he was classified as the ship's swimmer, which included water survival at sea and pilot rescue operations. He cannot count the number of times he has had to jump out of helicopters for training but he totally enjoyed every minute of it.

After the service, Mike ended up in San Diego, where he finished his high school education by receiving his GED. He went to work at National Steel Shipyard as a Loft Rigger working on Navy ships. After 3-1/2 years he decided to try his luck at driving big rigs and became a truck driver. He drove big rigs throughout the eleven Western United States and some parts of Mexico. After several years of driving, he became bored and started his own handyman business; mostly working for realtors for about 12 years (you name he probably did it). Mike finally ended up with SDG&E. He worked his way up the chain from Meter Reader to Field Utility Specialist/Project Manager for the Gas Technical Services Department. He worked for SDG&E for 14 years and finally retired on July 31st, 2020.

In 2001, a friend (and future Masonic brother) by the name of Bill Allen introduced Mike to Freemasonry while sitting in a barber's chair in Escondido (at Dell's Barber Shop on Grand Avenue). In due time, Mike was raised a Master Mason in February 2002 at Consuelo Lodge No.325. He hasn't looked back and has never regretted his decision to join us. Since becoming a Freemason, Mike discovered that Masonry runs deep in his heritage. His father was raised a Master Mason in Cavite, Philippines!

Mike feels that San Diego is blessed when it comes to Freemasonry in that all Masonic organizations (Blue Lodge, Scottish Rite, York Rite, Shrine & etc.) get along so well. There are several places and areas where they do not even talk to one another and are struggling. Mike is a member of about thirteen Masonic organizations and is active in all of them. Mike says, "I have been truly blessed with a lot of mentorship along the way and I am thankful for their support and guidance. This year I am honored to serve you as the Venerable Master of the Lodge of Perfection. Thank you for your support and assistance."


